Sabine Rijssenbeek

Sabine has over 30 years of experience as a rider and trainer of sport horses. As a rider she has competed at international FEI levels in the Netherlands and throughout Europe in both dressage and jumping events. As a trainer she works with horses and riders who compete at all levels of dressage. She holds a Level 3, the highest level offered in the Netherlands, International Trainer's Passport.

Sabine has had the privilege of training for many years with internationally renowned classical dressage trainers to include Piet Outhout and Henk van Bergen (both former trainers of the Dutch National Olympic Team). As a rider, her highest level of accomplishment was earning the privilege of being short-listed for the Dutch Olympic Dressage Team in 1980 (Moscow) Unfortunately her horse, Playboy's Sister died of colic two weeks prior to the Games. Following the 1980 Olympics, Sabine made a conscious decision to focus her efforts on a career as a professional trainer rather than a rider.

She now resides in Arizona and travels for clinics.

Mette Rosencrantz

Mette Rosencrantz has been based at Mill Creek since 1992. Mette is from Sweden where she was twice a member of the Swedish National Dressage Team. She was the youngest rider ever allowed to enter Stromsholm, Sweden's prestigious school for instructors, and eventually became the head dressage instructor there in 1980. Mette's expertise is also in great demand across the country, so she is often invited to teach Dressage Clinics, Symposia and Dressage Expos at other riding facilities throughout the United States and Canada.

Mette has shown at the Grand Prix Level on several horses and most recently on Basquerville, who won the Open Grand Prix at the World Cup in 2007. Mette also has several up and coming horses, such as Taison, who is scoring in the mid-70's the Intermediare 1 Level and will be moving up to Grand Prix in 2010. She also has Finally, who is an international quality horse. Mette's goal is to ride in the London Olympics in 2012 with her horses. Mette trains at all Dressage levels.

Shannon Deuck

Born in Austin, Texas, Shannon grew up outside of Vancouver, Canada. Her mother, Jaqueline Oldham is a "S" judge in dressage in both Canada and the USA. She went through her Pony Club levels, to attain her "A" status at 18 years of age, and also got her Canadian Coaching Level 2 status.

In 1994, Shannon spent many months in Holland as a working student for Bert Rutten. She rode in her first International competition in 1995 in California and was long-listed for the Canadian equestrian team in 1996 with Madison. In 1995 she bought her first real star, Korona, as a 3 year old from Bert Rutten.

Shannon trained Korona from the beginning. Winning an individual Silver Medal at the Pan Am Games in 1997. In 2002 at the World Championships in Spain they were the top Canadians finishing 23rd in the Grand Prix and 25th in the Grand Prix Special. After winning the Canadian league World Cup Final in 2002, they represented Canada at the World Cup final in Sweden in 2003. In 2003 they also were a part of the Canadian Team at the Open European Championships in England, which secured an Olympic berth for the Canadians for the following years Olympic Games. In 2004 they had a very successful training and competition tour at top International competitions in Holland, Germany and Austria. Shannon trains all levels of Dressage.
