Additional Recognized ODS Show Coming Soon!

ODS is making plans for a third recognized show in 2023! Thanks to the willingness of the ODS Show Committee (Roberta Clark, Sherry Guess, Kay Kamish) ODS is looking to the Fall of 2023 for dates to add a Level 1 show. An additional recognized show was considered in 2022 due to the cancellation of GCDC, but with so many weekends already tied up and Sherry being heavily involved with the remaining two sessions of the USDF "L" Program, it was determined wiser to take a year to make a better plan. Finding a free weekend is the challenge, attempting to have it early enough to be able for riders to have one more chance to earn scores to qualify for Regional Championships, and also not conflict with any CPDS shows. Remember, those scores must be earned 30 days prior to the Championships. Dates early enough to qualify for Region 4 and Region 9 are being considered. However, with Region 4 happening so early in the year, the 30 day requirement pushes the plan into mid-August.

A Successful USDF "L" Program — Highlights & Reflections

The USDF L Program A Session provided May 21-22, 2022 marked a new approach to presenting this highly educational program. Three GMOs (Central Plains Dressage Society, Kansas Dressage and Eventing Association, and Oklahoma Dressage Society) banded together to form a group to provide a program for all their members that would have been difficult to produce on their own.



The result was an A Session that was the largest USDF has experienced. There were 21 Participants, from across the nation, hoping to complete the program which is the first step on their way to the examination that would mark them as "L Program Graduates." If they wish to become USDF/USEF recognized judges, this is the beginning of that journey.

There were also 39 auditors at this gathering (a nearly at-capacity classroom!) who simply came to gain knowledge and insight into the remarks and observations of dressage judges.

In addition, eight riders graciously participated to demonstrate movements at the various levels. Many thanks to Training Level demonstrators **Alaina Butler** (Grunt Growl N Go), **Anna Drogemueller** (Pendragon), and **Christina Harmon** (Rose Marie). First Level **Patty Couch** (Brianne of Tarth), **Nicole Riffe** (Sun Dreamer), **Laura Taylor** (Lionheart). Second Level **Roberta Clark** (Indygo), **Patty Couch** (Gallant Prince von G), **Pamela Rhodes** (Details At Last).

The classroom portion was held at Rogers State University in Claremore and the mounted portion at Patty and Larry Couch's Rocking C Ranch in Inola.

The program will next be hosted by CPDS in Stillwater, OK on **July 30-31, 2022** for the B Session and by KDEA on **October 15-16** in Wichita, KS for the C Session.



10 Things To Do With Your Horse Other Than Riding (Ideas For Hot Summer Days!)

The hot summer days will soon be upon us and getting in a good training ride might not be in the cards when the heat index soars. Here are some ideas to consider to shake things up when spending time spent with your horse, especially on long, hot summer days.



- **1. Do Ground Work**: Consider these ideas for ground work: train your horse to stand still, lead properly, to flex and soften to pressure, to go on a circle, to move the front-end and hind-end, to back up without resistance.
- 2. <u>Give Your Horse a Makeover</u>: Giving your horse a makeover can be tons of fun, especially if it has been a while since you've done a full detail. You can give your horse a makeover by currying and brushing their coat, clipping and trimming whiskers, coronet band, ears and other areas that may be shaggy for a clean, finished look. A rich bubble bath from ears to tail would feel so good on a hot summer day!
- **3. Give Your Horse New Treats:** Something fun that both you and your horse can enjoy is having new treats! If you usually feed your horse the

same treats, why not experiment and try feeding them something new? You might even consider sharing an apple and some carrots, or even watermelon, bananas or pumpkin.

- **4.** <u>Take Your Horse for a Walk</u>: When you've been riding a lot, sometimes it's nice to slow things down and just take your horse on a relaxing walk. Having this special time without the demands of a schooling ride is great for bonding on the ground, building trust and just enjoying each other without many expectations.
- **5.** <u>Play With New Toys</u>: Introducing your horse to new toys on a regular basis is a great way to keep things interesting for them. A scented jolly ball, play feeder, apple lick or sturdy rubber ball suitable for livestock are some ideas to consider.
- **6. Do Desensitization Training With Your Horse:** Desensitization training involves gradually introducing your horse to things that they might find frightening and slowly teaching them that there's nothing to be afraid of. If your horse spooks easily, then desensitization training is a great thing to work on together. When introducing unusual objects, go slowly and with caution to avoid an accident.
- 7. <u>Make An Obstacle Course for Your Horse</u>: Obstacle courses are a great way to challenge a horse's mind, giving them something new and different to think about. Bridges made of sturdy 2x4s, orange cone mazes, ground pole patterns and gates to open and close are great options for obstacle courses.
- 8. Correct Your Horse's Behavioral Issues: Taking the time to work on bad habits is worth the investment of time and patience. Nipping, pawing, crowding, walking away at the mounting block, trailer loading...these are great things to work on now and will pay off later.

120 or less	Your horse's cooling system is functioning very effectively. You are safe to do all the riding and training you like with no real worries.
120-150	Cooling efficiency is decreasing through this range. Horses will sweat up with work, so make sure they have a chance to rest and cool off over the course of a long ride or heavy work.
150-180	A horse's ability to regulate its temperature is greatly reduced and heat stress is more likely, so be careful. Stick with light work and keep watch for signs of overheating. Make sure to cool your horse down properly afterwards.
180 or more	Your horse has lost the ability to regulate its temperature. Overworking a horse in these conditions can be dangerous, even fatal. Do your horse (and yourself) a favor and take the day off!!




9. Stretch Your Horse's Muscles: Teaching your horse to stretch by using a treat is always a lot of fun, and can also be entertaining for people to watch. Consider practicing backing up while on the ground as a great way to stretch the back and croup. Stretching helps your horse warm-up for a workout, cool down after a ride, improves their overall flexibility, and can also help your horse avoid injuries in the future.



10. Have a Photoshoot With Your Horse: When is the last time you had some high-quality photos taken with your horse? If the answer is never, why not get a friend with a nice camera or a local photographer to come out and snap a few photos? Years from now you'll be thankful that you did!

Oklahoma Dressage Society Education Scholarship Information & Application

The ODS Education Scholarship provides financial assistance to Oklahoma Dressage members to further their dressage education.



Criteria for Eligibility:

- 1. This ODS Education Scholarship is open to all Oklahoma Dressage Society Members: juniors, adults, or vintage riders, amateurs or professionals, including ODS member volunteers and committee members.
- 2. The candidate must be a current member in good standing of Oklahoma Dressage Society (ODS). In addition, the applicant must have been an ODS member for at least the 2 previous years.
- 3. The candidate must have a background of attending previous ODS dressage educational events. The more ODS event attendance, the stronger the candidate for the ODS scholarship. Attendance at non-ODS dressage educational events will be considered as additional input.
- 4. The candidate must have a background of volunteerism for ODS. This includes volunteering on at least one (1) ODS committee or have accumulated five (5) hours of volunteering at ODS events. The more ODS volunteerism, the stronger the candidate for the ODS scholarship. Volunteerism for non-ODS dressage related events will be considered as additional input.

Criteria for Use:

Scholarships may be used toward the registration/entry fees for the following types of dressage educational events:

- Acceptable activities will include ODS and its affiliated chapters educational events, USDF Region 9 and USDF educational events. Additionally, any educational event or clinic given by a USDF/USEF judge, USDF/USEF technical delegate, USDF Certified Instructor, USDF "L" Program graduate, or USDF Medalist.
- 2. Scholarship candidates must receive ODS Scholarship Committee approval for the use of this scholarship at a specific dressage educational event <u>prior</u> to the event occurring.

The ODS Scholarship Committee will review applications for funds and make recommendations to the Board for their vote. The Governing Board will select members to sit on this committee for a period of one year.

Application Deadline:

The ODS Education Scholarship committee will meet a minimum of two times per year. Each scholarship application must be received by the following schedule:

January 1 – May 15 Scholarship(s) to be awarded by June 15.

Presented at the ODS Summer Meeting.

May 16 - November 15 Scholarship(s) to be awarded by Dec. 15.

Presented at the ODS Annual General Meeting.

Please note: Your application must indicate an educational event that is after the award date.

Volunteer Hours: Volunteer hours counting towards ODS Education Scholarships include:

- Volunteering at ODS, its affiliated chapters and Region 9 sponsored shows, clinics, educational
 events, fundraisers, etc. Volunteer hours must be recorded and itemized on the ODS
 Education Scholarship Application Form. Validation of hours will be confirmed by the ODS
 Volunteer Coordinator from each event.
- 2. Write an article in the ODS newsletter.
- 3. Consideration will also be given for attendance at ODS, its affiliated chapters and Region 9 sponsored activities or functions. (ex: Summer Meeting, AGM or auditing the ODS Educational events).

Scholarship monies will not be awarded until after successful completion of attendance at the

approved dressage educational event with <u>validation of the attendance</u>; and, the <u>submission to ODS of the required post report</u>. An amount of \$200 will be awarded. Scholarship winners must write a post report article about their educational experience for which the scholarship was used and submit it to the ODS Scholarship Committee within 30 days of the event. This report / article will then be published in the newsletter.

The ODS Educational Scholarship is non-transferable and may only be used for the candidate's education. (ex. It may not be used for someone else riding your horse in a clinic.) Scholarships must be used within 1 year of the time it is awarded. No extensions will be granted.

The ODS Educational Scholarship Funds to administer the program should be held in a separate, interest-bearing account or with its own sub-account in ODS general funds. The ODS Educational Scholarship Fund must maintain a balance to fund this venture and a minimum of \$200 must remain in this account at all times. The funds generated by the silent auction at any AGM will be placed in the ODS Education Scholarship fund. Any sponsorship donations to this account will also be welcome.

Additional Information:

Scholarships may be applied for at any time of year by the corresponding deadline.

The ODS Educational Scholarship Committee will meet a minimum of two (2) times per year (June & December) to review all applications received up to that point and make the decisions about its awards. The ODS Educational Scholarship Committee may award zero (0) scholarships, or may award more than two (2) scholarships at each of these meetings as they deem fit. A maximum of four (4) Scholarships may be awarded each year. Not all allotted scholarships must be awarded in a single year. Determination of eligibility is at the sole discretion of the ODS Education Scholarship Committee.

An ODS member may only be awarded a scholarship once per twelve (12) months period. Once awarded a scholarship in a given twelve (12) months, a candidate may not apply again within that same twelve (12) months period. However, priority for subsequent years will be given to eligible candidates who have <u>not</u> received an education scholarship previously.

The ODS Education Scholarship Committee will include at least one (1) current ODS Board Member. The committee must consist of a total of three (3) to five (5) ODS members in good standing. The committee shall not exceed five (5) members.

A Cat's Puurr-spective On Riders' Muscle Tone

Mooorrrrrwwwww......my apologies for my absence from last month's newsletter. My human slave was not being helpful in getting my dictation down on paper. It's very difficult to get good help nowadays. She thought she deserved a va-CAT-tion. We had quite a discussion about that. What a snarl she got.....

So this month, I am thinking of the wonderful idea that horseback riding actually helps women build muscle tone. What started this thought sequence? It happened when I was listening to some 2-leggeds discuss about how horseback riding was NOT exercise and it was just sitting in a saddle and looking pretty. Rooowwwwlllll! NOT TRUE! I wanted to scratch some eyes out. How do I know that statement is not true? Because I've been talking with my horsey buddies while lying in the sun on their backs.

Here's what those horsey experts say: Scientific evidence has shown that after only 8 weeks of riding sessions, women gained considerable dynamic muscle tone in their thighs, hips, and torsos. (Makes you want to throw those old thigh-master gadgets in the recycle bin.) Being an equestrian activates the muscles around the thighs and hips and, at the same time, it can be said that the trunk extensor muscles are significantly improved due to the posture that requires straightening and due to the activated muscles around the thighs and hips. ["Effects of equine riding on static and dynamic mechanical contraction of the thighs and trunk muscles in inactive women," The Journal of Back Musculoskeletal Rehabilitation, July 13, 2021.]

My horse buddies tell me they know this is true because they hear their riders complain about their hips and thighs hurting soooo much. I didn't say much because my first thought was "Yah, sure, they hurt because your horsey bodies are too big around!" LOL They also said it was because lots of times their riders are hugging the horse's ribs and bellies really tightly with those thighs, hips and torsos, especially when the horses take the opportunity to run off across the sand. They had a really big neigh-ngh-ngh over that one. Makes me wonder about horsey humor....... could it be like when we kitties grab at our human slave's wiggling toes? Now, that's fun and muscle toning!

I think I understand about the strengthening of the rider's thighs, hips and torso because I experience a lot of that myself when my horsey buddy, whose back I'm sunbathing on, decides to move over to another spot. I have to work my thighs, hips and torso to keep me in place. It really tones me up, especially if I make the mistake of digging my claws in to hold on instead. That usually gives me some nice practice in the toning of my flight muscles......


