Additional Recognized ODS Show Coming Soon!

ODS is making plans for a third recognized show in 2023! Thanks to the willingness of the ODS Show Committee (Roberta Clark, Sherry Guess, Kay Kamish) ODS is looking to the Fall of 2023 for dates to add a Level 1 show. An additional recognized show was considered in 2022 due to the cancellation of GCDC, but with so many weekends already tied up and Sherry being heavily involved with the remaining two sessions of the USDF "L" Program, it was determined wiser to take a year to make a better plan. Finding a free weekend is the challenge, attempting to have it early enough to be able for riders to have one more chance to earn scores to qualify for Regional Championships, and also not conflict with any CPDS shows. A Successful USDF Session A of the "L" Program

Highlights & Reflections

What an exceptional weekend so many of us were able to experience. Sherry Guess and her team did an outstanding job putting on the first of 3 "L" program sessions.

Saturday morning and through the afternoon we went through enormous amounts of information. Joan Darnell did such a wonderful job explaining what we are to be looking for as a judge. She asked many questions. What are we looking at? Do we

understand the basics? Do we understand the criteria of the exercise (was the movement performed as explained in the USEF rule book).

Then she went on to talk about how we need to have a formula when we judge. Certain words we use in our comments should match up with the score we give for a movement. For instance on the 20 meter circle at the trot if we say "needs more" that coincides with a score of a 6, then state what they need more of, like bend or throughness.

She talked about non brilliance factor movements. These are movements that any horse can do. For example turn on the haunches and rein back. The horse does not need to be a talented mover to obtain a high score. These movements are treated differently than other movements.

She touched on modifiers. What are they? They are things to take into consideration such as corners, shying, stumbling and inattention. She spoke of the horse's confirmation, the biomechanics of the horse and the gaits. She touched on the new dress code rules for horse and rider. Big changes there. So much information!!!

Sunday afternoon after our morning session in the classroom we had the opportunity to head over to Inola to Rocking C Ranch, where we were able to watch some great demo riders go through the tests. She explained her scoring method and why she gave the score she did.

Overall it was such a great weekend. I'm so excited for session B. I love to learn and am soaking up this knowledge

like a sponge. If any of you have the opportunity to come audit the next session at Valley View you absolutely should. Such vast amounts of information that every competitor should know.

Thank you Oklahoma Dressage Society for this wonderful session!

I had the pleasure of attending the Lilo Fore Symposium hosted by the Oklahoma Dressage Society in early April.

The event was well attended and the demo riders were amazing to watch. Not only did they allow us to watch their process, we could see progress with each exercise. I was pleased to see such a wonderful variety of horses and riders and the whole training spectrum. Seeing Lilo's thoughtful approach to each horse and rider team was inspiring.

I was especially interested in the third and fourth level exercises as that is where I am currently training. A bonus for me was watching my trainer, Roberta Clark, and her horse, Indygo, receive instruction. Also helpful is that as I got to observe her rides and she could bring what she learned back to the barn and apply these skills to my lessons.

As I ride on my own, it is helpful to think of the metronome Lilo spoke of. The tips for the half pass have aided in our improvement in that movement, riding into the shortening of the strides and not sacrificing the quality of the gaits were very helpful reminders to me. Since Charlie and I are learning together as we move up the levels, the most important and valuable takeaway was to be positive and generous with our horses, ourselves and other riders putting themselves out there.

I am grateful to ODS for putting on such a quality program and for the riders that allowed themselves to be critiqued. I hope I have that opportunity some day.

After lunch, honored guest Dr. Kim Rassmussen gave a most compelling talk about that mysterious 'little' bone called the hyoid. Little? Think again! Check out the report on her talk in this newsletter issue!

ODS Summer Meeting's Keynote Speaker Dr. Kim Rassmussen: The Hyoid Bone

Dr. Kim Rassmussen is a name well known by many involved with horses in Oklahoma. She graduated from College of Veterinary Medicine at Iowa State University in 2004, initially practicing the way she had been taught. She had a TB gelding with a persistently sore back that no conventional treatments were fixing (sound familiar?).


She had the good fortune to meet up with the man who brought the concept of Osteopathic work on horses, Janek Vluggen, and the rest, as they say, is history. She attended the Vluggen Institute for Equine Osteopathy and received her Diploma of Equine Osteopathy in 2009. She practiced this work for a decade, and then in 2020 was invited to meet with Dr. Stiles, a human DO who was very interested to learn about her Osteopathic work with horses and became interested enough to come to her clinic to watch her work, offering observations and suggestions to refine her techniques. They have remained in touch with each other ever since, continuing to learn from each other.

With Janek's help and guidance her TB was returned to soundness, and Dr. Kim was on her way on the path to a different kind of intervention and care. She began her presentation with a brief history of Osteopathic medicine, how it is similar to, and different from the conventional medicine practiced by an MD. Then she zeroed in on the focus of her talk, the hyoid bone, or more correctly, the hyoid apparatus. I don't know about anyone else, but I always thought the hyoid bone was that spurshaped little bone in the throat of the horse at the base of the tongue. Much to our amazement, it is a complex system of 5 bones, with two very long extensions that run up the inside of the jaw to the temporal area (TMJ) just below the ear.

To amplify the point, Dr. Kim had a sample of an actual hyoid apparatus that was passed around so we could see and move the bones to really comprehend what this system is like. She said the saying is that the horse actually has 6 legs, with the two long extensions being the extra two 'legs'. She went on to describe the critical nature of the hyoid (swallowing, balance, muscle attachments) and how very easily this delicate set of bones can be damaged or disrupted and cause all manner of pain and imbalance for the horses. It is at the crossroads of the airway and the esophagus (therefore critical for swallowing), the origin of the tongue muscles, and has muscular attachments for the muscles of the larynx and occiput (poll) and long muscular attachments reaching to even the sternum and the shoulder! She described how she makes her assessment of the hyoid when she is treating horses, delicately feeling for it at the base of the tongue, between the mandibles. This sensitive awareness then leads her to feeling along the other related structures, the poll, the sternum, the muscles attached, and allows her to make adjustments or releases as needed.

This talk was amazing, and I know we are all very lucky to have this caring person available to care for our equine buddies ~ thanks, Dr. Kim!!!

DIY Horse Grooming Wipes

Materials

3/4 cup Distilled water 1/4 cup Witch Hazel 1 tsp. Fractionated Coconut Oil Essential Oils (optional)

Instructions

Combine ingredients and mix.

Fill a separate small container or ziplock bag with several cloths, rags or extra-strong paper towels and pour in liquid. You want to add enough that the cloths are moist, but not dripping wet.

Mix well and keep them stored in the bag/ container.

Use to remove dirt, dust, mud, sweat.

Essential Oils are optional, but a nice touch. Lavender and Peppermint are two nice options.

Horse Cooling Hacks

The internet is full of hacks for many life situations, and cooling off your horse is no exception. Here are some hacks we found interesting:

Equine Cooling Wraps. There are various cooling wraps on the market that you can wet with cold water and wrap or drape on your horse's body to cool down a targeted area quickly.

Otter Pops. If you want to save on cooling wraps, wrap your horse's legs with an otter pop pack and then perform a regular polo or vet wrap on top of the popsicles. The natural separation of the popsicles allows for them to wrap nicely around the leg, so long as the exterior wrap is not too tight. The pops will melt, but they will cool down legs quickly and work better for a horse that refuses to stand in an ice bucket.

Cooling Sprays. There are various gel sprays on the market that are recommended for cooling a horse's muscles down. (Please contact your veterinarian before applying a topical coolant other than water.)

Giant Ice Cubes. Freeze gallon jugs full of water and add them to water troughs to act as giant ice cubes to keep troughs cool.

TDF Updates

What a summer it has been! Along with heatwave after heatwave outside, things at TDF have been heating up as well. Here is an update for you!

- 1) Since the beginning of the year, TDF has awarded nearly \$45,000 for educational events in 16 states and Puerto Rico so far in 2022. An estimated 225+ riders and 350+ auditors have taken part or will take part in these TDF-supported events.
- 2) We announced the Young Rider Dream Program: Wellington 2023. If you know a young rider, 18-22, who is riding at Third Level or higher, and has never trained or competed in the Wellington area, please have them apply for this all-expensespaid program. HEAT INDEX vs HORSES



"COOL" FACTS:

- Horses heat up 3-10 times faster than humans.
- Exercise is a major source of body heat; even 17 minutes of gentle exercise in hot weather can raise a horse's internal temperature to dangerous levels.
- Horses, like people, need to sweat for thermoregulation (cooling); sweat is more efficient at removing heat when it evaporates.

Oklahoma Dressage Society Education Scholarship Information & Application

The ODS Education Scholarship provides financial assistance to Oklahoma Dressage members to further their dressage education.



Criteria for Eligibility:

- 1. This ODS Education Scholarship is open to all Oklahoma Dressage Society Members: juniors, adults, or vintage riders, amateurs or professionals, including ODS member volunteers and committee members.
- 2. The candidate must be a current member in good standing of Oklahoma Dressage Society (ODS). In addition, the applicant must have been an ODS member for at least the 2 previous years.
- 3. The candidate must have a background of attending previous ODS dressage educational events. The more ODS event attendance, the stronger the candidate for the ODS scholarship. Attendance at non-ODS dressage educational events will be considered as additional input.
- 4. The candidate must have a background of volunteerism for ODS. This includes volunteering on at least one (1) ODS committee or have accumulated five (5) hours of volunteering at ODS events. The more ODS volunteerism, the stronger the candidate for the ODS scholarship. Volunteerism for non-ODS dressage related events will be considered as additional input.

Criteria for Use:

Scholarships may be used toward the registration/entry fees for the following types of dressage educational events:

- Acceptable activities will include ODS and its affiliated chapters educational events, USDF Region 9 and USDF educational events. Additionally, any educational event or clinic given by a USDF/USEF judge, USDF/USEF technical delegate, USDF Certified Instructor, USDF "L" Program graduate, or USDF Medalist.
- 2. Scholarship candidates must receive ODS Scholarship Committee approval for the use of this scholarship at a specific dressage educational event <u>prior</u> to the event occurring.

The ODS Scholarship Committee will review applications for funds and make recommendations to the Board for their vote. The Governing Board will select members to sit on this committee for a period of one year.

Application Deadline:

The ODS Education Scholarship committee will meet a minimum of two times per year. Each scholarship application must be received by the following schedule:

January 1 – May 15 Scholarship(s) to be awarded by June 15.

Presented at the ODS Summer Meeting.

May 16 - November 15 Scholarship(s) to be awarded by Dec. 15.

Presented at the ODS Annual General Meeting.

Please note: Your application must indicate an educational event that is after the award date.

Volunteer Hours: Volunteer hours counting towards ODS Education Scholarships include:

- Volunteering at ODS, its affiliated chapters and Region 9 sponsored shows, clinics, educational
 events, fundraisers, etc. Volunteer hours must be recorded and itemized on the ODS
 Education Scholarship Application Form. Validation of hours will be confirmed by the ODS
 Volunteer Coordinator from each event.
- 2. Write an article in the ODS newsletter.
- 3. Consideration will also be given for attendance at ODS, its affiliated chapters and Region 9 sponsored activities or functions. (ex: Summer Meeting, AGM or auditing the ODS Educational events).

Scholarship monies will not be awarded until after successful completion of attendance at the

approved dressage educational event with <u>validation of the attendance</u>; and, the <u>submission to ODS of the required post report</u>. An amount of \$200 will be awarded. Scholarship winners must write a post report article about their educational experience for which the scholarship was used and submit it to the ODS Scholarship Committee within 30 days of the event. This report / article will then be published in the newsletter.

The ODS Educational Scholarship is non-transferable and may only be used for the candidate's education. (ex. It may not be used for someone else riding your horse in a clinic.) Scholarships must be used within 1 year of the time it is awarded. No extensions will be granted.

The ODS Educational Scholarship Funds to administer the program should be held in a separate, interest-bearing account or with its own sub-account in ODS general funds. The ODS Educational Scholarship Fund must maintain a balance to fund this venture and a minimum of \$200 must remain in this account at all times. The funds generated by the silent auction at any AGM will be placed in the ODS Education Scholarship fund. Any sponsorship donations to this account will also be welcome.

Additional Information:

Scholarships may be applied for at any time of year by the corresponding deadline.

The ODS Educational Scholarship Committee will meet a minimum of two (2) times per year (June & December) to review all applications received up to that point and make the decisions about its awards. The ODS Educational Scholarship Committee may award zero (0) scholarships, or may award more than two (2) scholarships at each of these meetings as they deem fit. A maximum of four (4) Scholarships may be awarded each year. Not all allotted scholarships must be awarded in a single year. Determination of eligibility is at the sole discretion of the ODS Education Scholarship Committee.

An ODS member may only be awarded a scholarship once per twelve (12) months period. Once awarded a scholarship in a given twelve (12) months, a candidate may not apply again within that same twelve (12) months period. However, priority for subsequent years will be given to eligible candidates who have <u>not</u> received an education scholarship previously.

The ODS Education Scholarship Committee will include at least one (1) current ODS Board Member. The committee must consist of a total of three (3) to five (5) ODS members in good standing. The committee shall not exceed five (5) members.




