some reflecting.


I hope you are all well in your world, your community, with your horses and with your lives!

ODS is so very grateful for Sherry and her dedication and generous support of this program, where all members benefit!



4 easy ways to ice-proof your horse's hooves


The rock-hard accumulations of ice and snow that can get packed into a horse's feet can cause lameness and injury.

One winter hazard that riders in cold climes know well is ice balls. When snow and ice get packed under a horse's hoof, it warms up slightly against the sole, then freezes readily against the cold metal of the shoe. The ice can quickly build up until the horse is walking on a hard, solid mass of frozen material, called "ice balls" or "snowballs." The wetter and more dense the snow, the more likely it is that snowballs will occur. "Slushier" ice will fall away from the foot more readily, and light, dry snow won't pack well, but wet or icy snow can easily get compacted into a tight, hard block.

Walking on the uneven mass even for a short time can cause a number of problems from tripping and sliding to strains or sprains of the muscles, tendons and joints. Persistent snowballs can lead to bruises and hoof cracks. Horses do OK much of the time when there is snow all around, but once on a firm surface, many will teeter as if

- 2. Add anti-snowball pads. If your horse wears shoes throughout the winter, ask your farrier about anti-snowball pads. There are two types: One is a heavy plastic or rubber insert that covers the horse's sole and features a convex "bubble" that forces the snow and slush out with each step. The other, called a rim pad or tube pad, consists of a raised rubber tube that circles around the inner perimeter of the shoe but does not cover the frog or sole. Both are about equally effective at keeping out the snow and ice, but you'll need to be diligent about cleaning your horse's feet because mud and manure may build up under the pads.
- **3. Try a home remedy.** Ask a group of horsepeople about snowballs and you'll hear plenty of suggestions for substances to apply to a horse's soles to prevent snow and ice from sticking. These home remedies are not as effective or long lasting as antisnowball pads, but they may be helpful at times, especially if ice is only an occasional problem where you live. Thick, sticky preparations, such as Vaseline or Crisco, are more effective than thinner ones, such as cooking spray or baby oil. However, avoid using motor oil, WD-40 or other potentially caustic or hazardous substances. If you wouldn't want it on your own skin, do not apply it to your horse's feet.
- **4. Get your horse hoof boots.** If your horse tends to accumulate snowballs on your winter rides, hoof boots can help keep his feet clean and dry. Make sure you choose boots that fit your horse well, without rubbing, and that the treads provide the right amount of traction for the terrain where you ride. If your horse is shod, choose a model designed to be worn over shoes.



Reminder: Renew Your USEF Safe Sport Annually

Creating a healthy, supportive, and safe community for our participants- especially our youngest athletes - is USEF's top priority. The USEF Safe Sport Policy and Minor Athlete Abuse Prevention Policies (MAAPP) are designed to protect all participants. One strategy we have implemented is SafeSport Training, which educates members as to how to identify and respond to signs of abusive behavior. It also raises awareness as to the federal law that mandates USEF participants to report certain abuse to the authorities and the U.S. Center for SafeSport.



This is a courtesy reminder that your SafeSport Training may be due to be refreshed in accordance with the USEF Safe Sport Policy. Your role requires you to refresh your training annually.

Failure to timely refresh your training will result in the following restrictions:

- You will be included on the ineligibility list and thus, will be ineligible to participate in USEF competitions and activities. This includes volunteer service in USEF governance roles and USEF activities, including competitions. Your horse(s) will be ineligible to compete if the exhibiting rider/ trainer / owner is ineligible due to failure to complete SafeSport Training.
 - If you compete while ineligible, any points earned by you and/or your horse(s) will not count.
- USA FEI athletes and horses are ineligible to be entered into any national or international competition, domestically and abroad.
- Licensed Officials and Competition Managers are ineligible to officiate or serve in any official capacity at USEF licensed or endorsed competitions and any USEF activity.

As a reminder, the SafeSport Trained Core course must be completed every four years. It is a 90-minute course comprised of multiple units. You are urged to begin your SafeSport Training in advance of the expiration date, leaving time to resolve any technical issues if necessary.

Victims and survivors of sexual abuse can request an exemption from the training requirement. Requests may be made directly to the U.S. Center for SafeSport at exemptions@safesport.org.

Oklahoma Dressage Society Education Scholarship Information & Application

The ODS Education Scholarship provides financial assistance to Oklahoma Dressage members to further their dressage education.



Criteria for Eligibility:

- 1. This ODS Education Scholarship is open to all Oklahoma Dressage Society Members: juniors, adults, or vintage riders, amateurs or professionals, including ODS member volunteers and committee members.
- 2. The candidate must be a current member in good standing of Oklahoma Dressage Society (ODS). In addition, the applicant must have been an ODS member for at least the 2 previous years.
- 3. The candidate must have a background of attending previous ODS dressage educational events. The more ODS event attendance, the stronger the candidate for the ODS scholarship. Attendance at non-ODS dressage educational events will be considered as additional input.
- 4. The candidate must have a background of volunteerism for ODS. This includes volunteering on at least one (1) ODS committee or have accumulated five (5) hours of volunteering at ODS events. The more ODS volunteerism, the stronger the candidate for the ODS scholarship. Volunteerism for non-ODS dressage related events will be considered as additional input.

Criteria for Use:

Scholarships may be used toward the registration/entry fees for the following types of dressage educational events:

- Acceptable activities will include ODS and its affiliated chapters educational events, USDF Region 9 and USDF educational events. Additionally, any educational event or clinic given by a USDF/USEF judge, USDF/USEF technical delegate, USDF Certified Instructor, USDF "L" Program graduate, or USDF Medalist.
- 2. Scholarship candidates must receive ODS Scholarship Committee approval for the use of this scholarship at a specific dressage educational event <u>prior</u> to the event occurring.

The ODS Scholarship Committee will review applications for funds and make recommendations to the Board for their vote. The Governing Board will select members to sit on this committee for a period of one year.

Application Deadline:

The ODS Education Scholarship committee will meet a minimum of two times per year. Each scholarship application must be received by the following schedule:

January 1 – May 15 Scholarship(s) to be awarded by June 15.

Presented at the ODS Summer Meeting.

May 16 - November 15 Scholarship(s) to be awarded by Dec. 15.

Presented at the ODS Annual General Meeting.

Please note: Your application must indicate an educational event that is after the award date.

Volunteer Hours: Volunteer hours counting towards ODS Education Scholarships include:

- Volunteering at ODS, its affiliated chapters and Region 9 sponsored shows, clinics, educational
 events, fundraisers, etc. Volunteer hours must be recorded and itemized on the ODS
 Education Scholarship Application Form. Validation of hours will be confirmed by the ODS
 Volunteer Coordinator from each event.
- 2. Write an article in the ODS newsletter.
- 3. Consideration will also be given for attendance at ODS, its affiliated chapters and Region 9 sponsored activities or functions. (ex: Summer Meeting, AGM or auditing the ODS Educational events).

Scholarship monies will not be awarded until after successful completion of attendance at the

approved dressage educational event with <u>validation of the attendance</u>; and, the <u>submission to ODS of the required post report</u>. An amount of \$200 will be awarded. Scholarship winners must write a post report article about their educational experience for which the scholarship was used and submit it to the ODS Scholarship Committee within 30 days of the event. This report / article will then be published in the newsletter.



The ODS Educational Scholarship is non-transferable and may only be used for the candidate's education. (ex. It may not be used for someone else riding your horse in a clinic.) Scholarships must be used within 1 year of the time it is awarded. No extensions will be granted.

The ODS Educational Scholarship Funds to administer the program should be held in a separate, interest-bearing account or with its own sub-account in ODS general funds. The ODS Educational Scholarship Fund must maintain a balance to fund this venture and a minimum of \$200 must remain in this account at all times. The funds generated by the silent auction at any AGM will be placed in the ODS Education Scholarship fund. Any sponsorship donations to this account will also be welcome.

Additional Information:

Scholarships may be applied for at any time of year by the corresponding deadline.

The ODS Educational Scholarship Committee will meet a minimum of two (2) times per year (June & December) to review all applications received up to that point and make the decisions about its awards. The ODS Educational Scholarship Committee may award zero (0) scholarships, or may award more than two (2) scholarships at each of these meetings as they deem fit. A maximum of four (4) Scholarships may be awarded each year. Not all allotted scholarships must be awarded in a single year. Determination of eligibility is at the sole discretion of the ODS Education Scholarship Committee.

An ODS member may only be awarded a scholarship once per twelve (12) months period. Once awarded a scholarship in a given twelve (12) months, a candidate may not apply again within that same twelve (12) months period. However, priority for subsequent years will be given to eligible candidates who have <u>not</u> received an education scholarship previously.

The ODS Education Scholarship Committee will include at least one (1) current ODS Board Member. The committee must consist of a total of three (3) to five (5) ODS members in good standing. The committee shall not exceed five (5) members.

Cat & Horse Senses Differ: A First-Pawed Story

This being the start of a new year, our daily sunshine group has cracked open some new topics in our chatting. Horses being horses and cats being cats has made us all aware of a few things; mainly that there are differences between how we perceive the world around us.

An example being found in this recent story: So, I was lying on my favorite buddy's broad back in the sun the other day while talking away (I've been told I like to chatter a lot), when one of our herd flung her head up from eating the dry grass with a simple, "Do you smell that?" We all stuck our heads up and looked around twitching each of our individual noses. What was she smelling? I didn't smell a thing on the breeze, nor did I see anything to be worried about. I was more interested in putting my head back down on my buddy's warm back and closing my eyes. Ahhhh... the sun..... Yep, I saw our 2-legged walking toward the pasture gate with a halter; but, that wasn't anything out of the ordinary and I knew it wasn't meant for me. Nothing to be worried about, right? So, why was everyone else getting their tails in a twirling mess? They were acting like they smelled some kind of predator. Our 2-legged got closer. Whoa, wait...! She was reaching up toward me in my warm place. The others started backing away. Then I smelled it! Grrroowwwwl...! She had that acidic, bright, nose-burning smelly stuff on her hands again. 




